



Programming at both the Moon Township and Ambridge centers was enhanced through **community connections** such as student visits, communion services provided by local churches, pet therapy visits, local entertainment and much more.

Valley Care



VNA provides low-cost, high quality services to more than

1,200 people each day through our Home Health Care, Palliative Care and Hospice programs. In addition, 1,000 of our patients are being kept safe in their homes through the use of our Telehealth monitors and PERS (Personal Emergency Response System) units.

Last year, VNA, through BeHome Partners™, provided more than 30,000 hours of private

duty services to those who need some help at home such as personal care assistance, housekeeping, meal preparation and much more.

Hospice caretakers and volunteers continued to provide unparalleled medical and emotional support to those with a life-limiting illness and their families either in the patient's home or at our inpatient facility in Butler.

We have improved the health of our communities by providing monthly blood pressure/wellness clinics, bereavement classes, diabetic education classes and by serving as a trusted

"Thanks to everyone at St. John, I was able to return home to my family!"

Rita Lambert, a former St. John Specialty Care Center resident, is grateful to be alive.

After some serious health problems and a hospitalization earlier this year, she went to St. John to receive extensive rehabilitation therapies.

"Everyone said that I had just made up my mind that I was tired of being sick, and I was going to work hard at getting better," -she said.

After just a few months of physical, occupational and speech therapy and balance and endurance training, Rita made a remarkable recovery.

Their Own Words

Following a mini-stroke, 93-year old Patricia Crowley began having trouble swallowing, which, in turn, caused her to lose a dangerous amount of weight. Doctors wanted to give her a feeding tube.

She and her therapists at LIFE Beaver County decided to try Vital Stimulation therapy on her throat to help strengthen her muscles in hopes of making swallowing easier.

"I didn't want something like this to slow me down," Crowley said. "And so I just decided that the therapy would work, and it has!"

She happily reported that she is gaining back her weight and plans to travel to Chicago soon to visit her new great-grandchild.

"I believe the treatments helped her swallow," Sechrist said, "however I also believe Patricia's motivation and tenacity are what keep her living an **Abundant Life**."





The combined efforts of the SilverSmart[™] Technology program and our visual rehabilitation therapists are helping many of our residents with low vision and other vision impairments.

"We are blessed with a wonderful staff here at Lutheran SeniorLife," said resident Pr. Victor Redfoot.

"I want to let people know they don't have to stop doing things they love just because they have vision loss. There are people here who can help."

"We are so fortunate to be so progressive in addressing the issue of low vision," said Mary Pat Sherman, manager of rehabilitation services. "As a company, we are taking a significant problem and finding solutions to help the residents."

"It was so great!
I hadn't done that in 75 years.
I'm so thankful to have been given the opportunity to do it again!"


